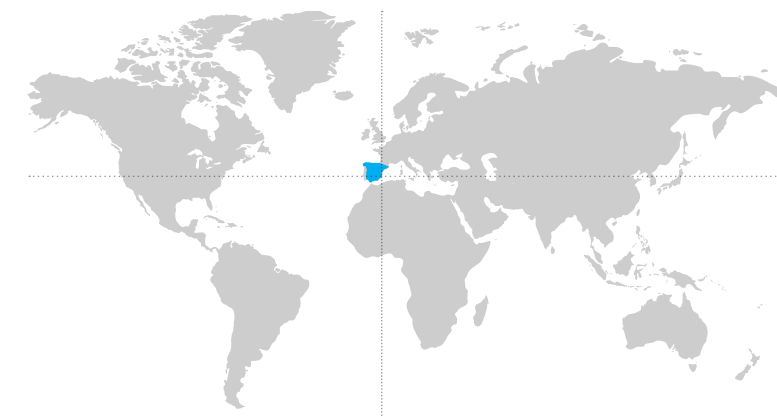

Alicante is one of Spain's biggest and best equipped cities in terms of infrastructure, and its location, connecting Europe, North Africa and the Middle East, and enabling communication between Asia, Europe and America, gives it superb competitive advantages for investors.

*The city is open to contact with other regions and is supported by a global intermodal system that includes **the sea port and the international airport, the High-Speed train and freight rail link, plus a comprehensive network of highways and motorways.** This makes it the main logistics hub for south-eastern Spain, the centre of the Mediterranean Arc and a gateway to the rest of the world.*



NETWORK OF ROADS, HIGHWAYS AND MOTORWAYS

Alicante has road links with every location in Spain and with the rest of Europe. It has a comprehensive network of highways and motorways, plus ring roads, making it easy to move around the province of Alicante.

The AP7 and A7, which share stretches of road, both link France with Algeciras and Gibraltar. They are part of European Route E15, which reaches as far as Inverness in the United Kingdom. The A31 also runs from Alicante all the way to Madrid.

INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT

In 2017, **more than 13.7 million passengers** passed through this airport on their way to or from more than seventy cities across the world. That same year, more than **95,000 flights** arrived or departed Alicante airport, moving more than **three million kilos of freight**.

The airport is only ten minutes away from the city centre via a two-lane highway. Destinations have increased by more than 40% since 2014.

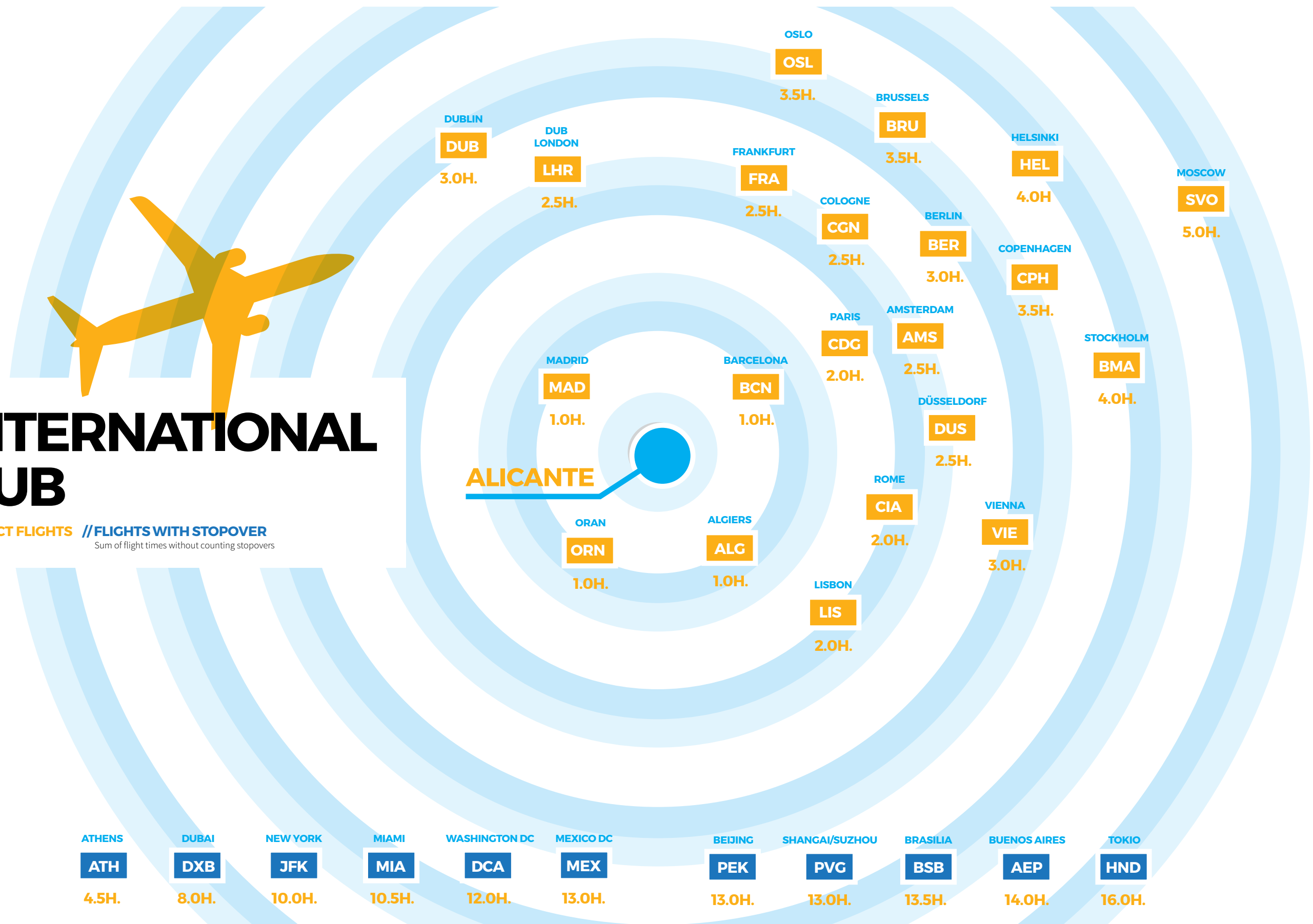

Alicante is the natural overseas departure point for industry, with links to Europe, America and North Africa. The results achieved in 2016 place the port in an extremely strong position to tackle new challenges, including updating the facilities and services provided, or the possibility of making prices more competitive, whilst also reviewing strategy and making a commitment to the environment and sustainability in order to contribute greater value to society.

In 2016, operations were carried out to handle almost three and a half million tonnes of goods. In terms of passenger transport, during that same year, the port was visited by 54 tourist ships carrying more than 150,000 passengers. Plus, Alicante Port has been a Cruise Home Port since 2016 and the cruise terminal license holder is Mediterranean Events.

It is perfectly connected with the main land transport networks:

- By road, it has its own exclusive entrance via the A-31 and the A-7, AP-7.
- By rail, the lines running to Madrid, Murcia and Granada all meet in the port.

HIGH-SPEED TRAIN

Spain is the top country in Europe and second in the world in terms of the number of high-speed rail link kilometres in operation, ahead of countries with a long-standing tradition of this method of transport like Japan and France.

The Alicante high-speed railway line started operating in 2013 and the Alicante-Madrid AVE currently carried more than two million passengers a year, with 7,000 users per day. The train can travel the distance between the two cities **in less than two hours**, reaching a speed of 3,110 kilometres per hour, connecting Alicante with the more than 3,200 kilometres of high-speed railway networks all over Spain, Portugal and the rest of Europe.

MEDITERRANEAN CORRIDOR

The Mediterranean Corridor is an infrastructure project due to be completed in a few years' time and expected to improve connections between the Spanish east coast and the south of France:

- Greater flow of goods into Europe.
- Connection with all the major cities in the Mediterranean Arc.
- Reduction in transport time for both people and goods.

More than 40% of the Spanish population lives along the railway connection between Murcia and Barcelona. This is also where 40% of the country's exports are generated and where 70% of sea port traffic comes from.

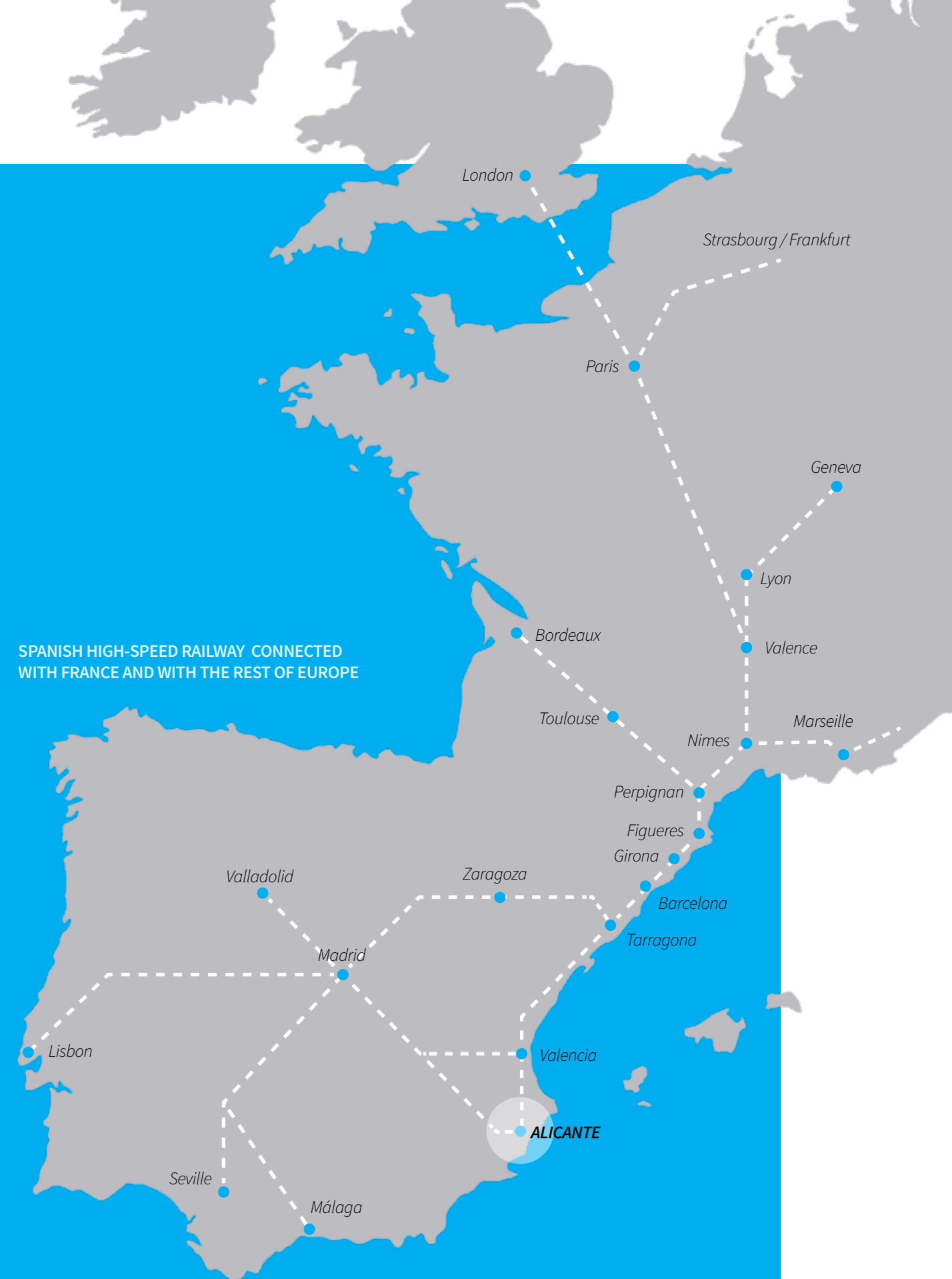
THE WORLD'S MOST ADVANCED RAILWAY

IN TERMS OF TECHNOLOGY

The AVE project aims to reproduce the circular road network with railway lines that do the same job. The government has announced that, during 2015, a further 1,000 kilometres are to be added to the High-Speed link operating around the country, with extra destinations like Vigo, Palencia, León, Burgos, Zamora, Cáceres, Mérida, Badajoz, Cádiz, Granada, Murcia and Castellón.

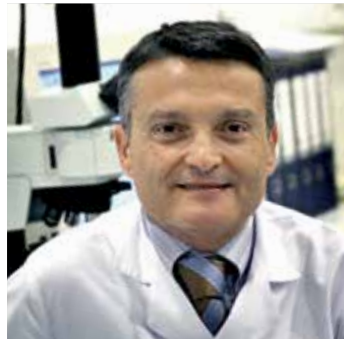

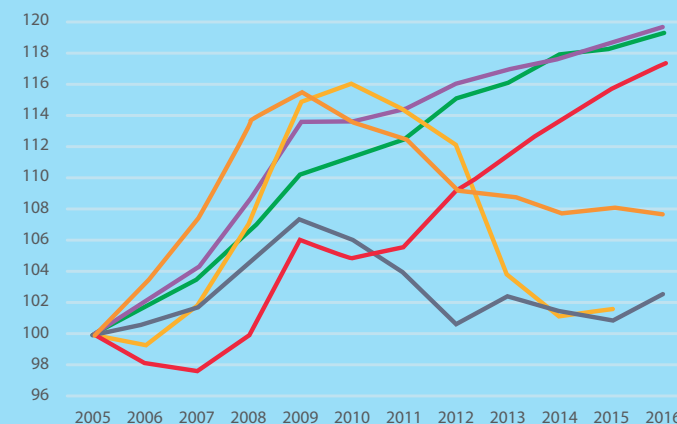

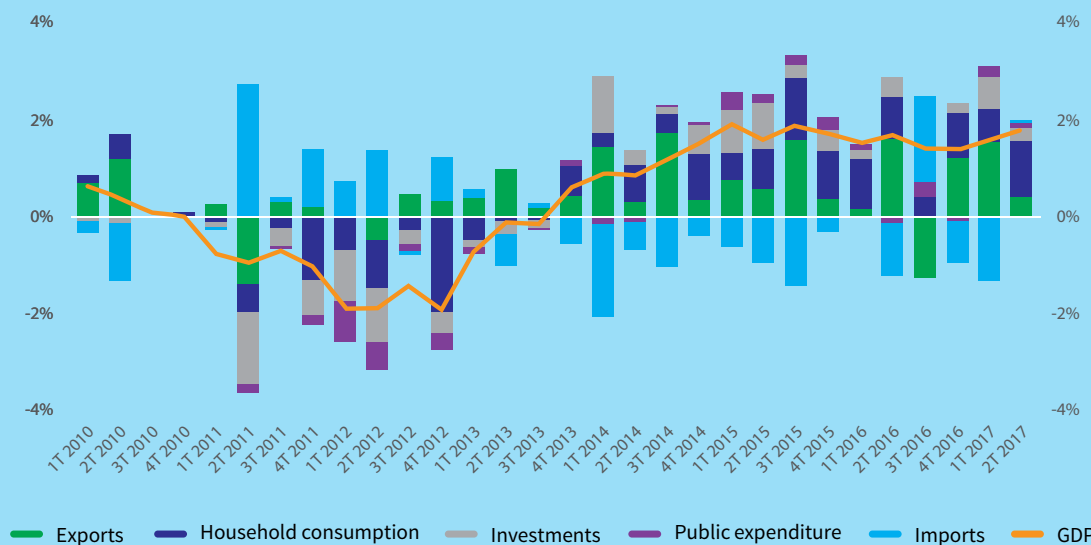
NOMINAL UNIT LABOUR COSTS, 2005 = 100

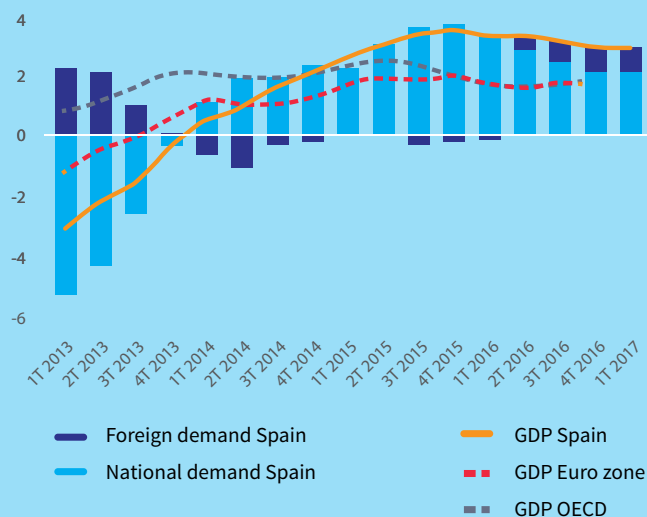
ALICANTE, 5TH PROVINCE BY GDP IN SPAIN

Spain maintains a positive growth ratio compared to the OECD and the Euro zone.

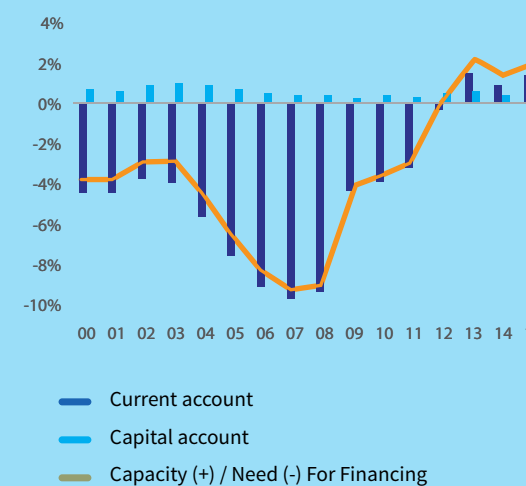

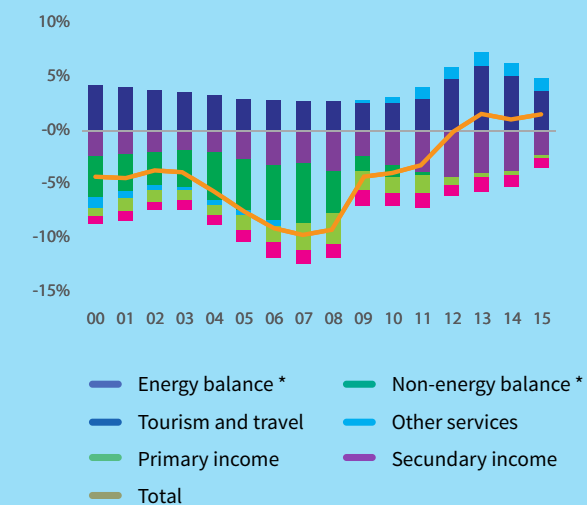

2. Current account. Balances % of GDP

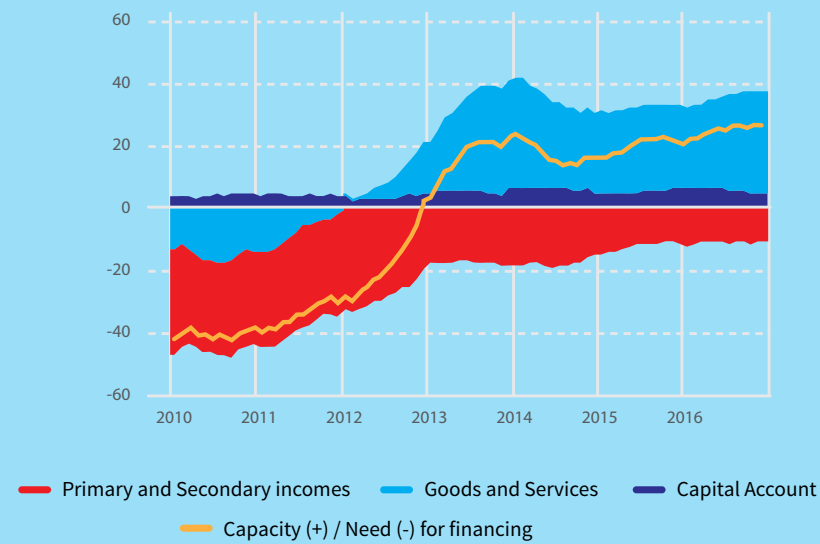

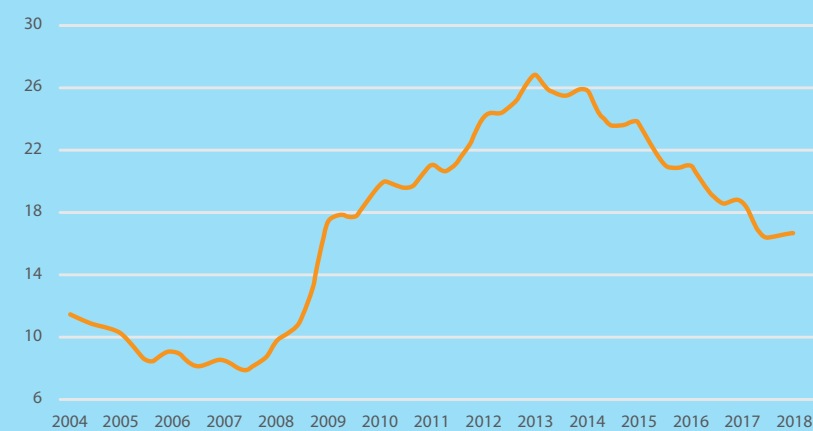
CAPACITY (+) / NEED (-) FOR FINANCING OF THE NATION

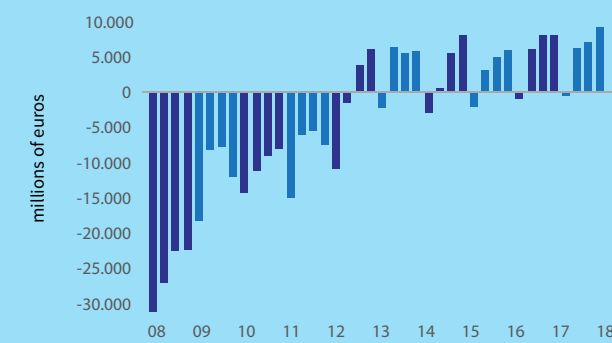
UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

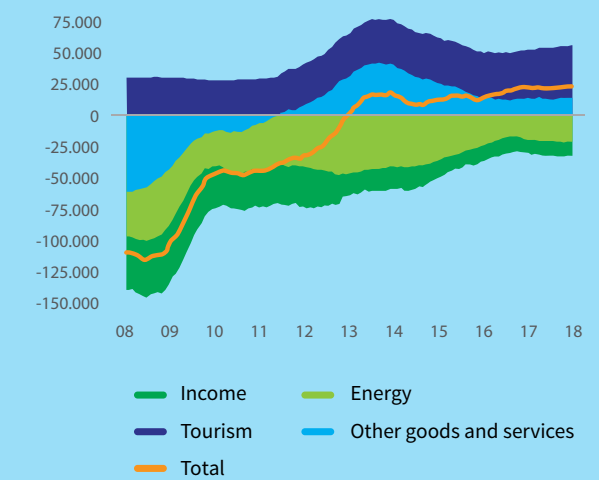
CURRENT ACCOUNT BALANCE

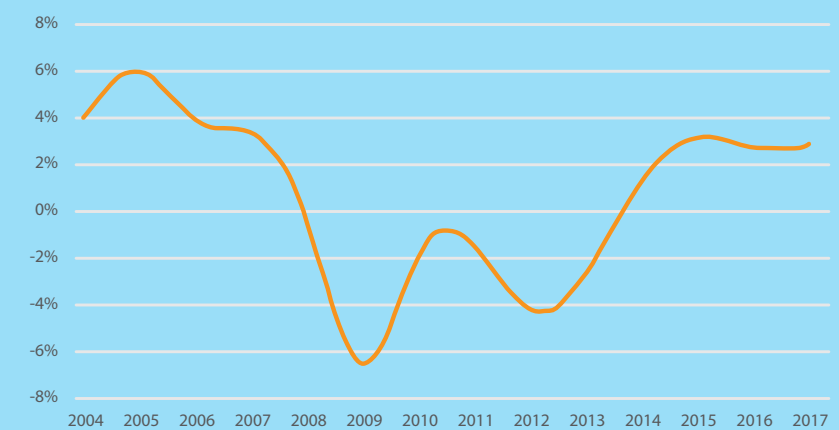

AUXILIARY INDUSTRY

Alicante offers investors support for their business by providing a strong business fabric that is expanding across the province of which it is the capital. The Alicante business network is extremely well established and a world leader in sectors such as footwear and leather goods, toys, textiles and yarns, marbles and gravel, plastics and chemical industries.

FINANCING, INCENTIVES AND SUBSIDIES

Administration bodies offer an interesting package of incentives and financing for overseas companies setting up in the Alicante municipal area. Institutions such as the Ministries of Industry, Trade and Tourism, and Inland Revenue plus organisations like Invest in Spain all offer funding for advertising, competitiveness plans, stimulus for investment and reindustrialisation, as well as funds for R&D+i.

The Valencian Institute of Business Competitiveness · IVACE

The international department of IVACE has a series of grants adapted to suit the needs of foreign businesses. The Institute awards loans for foreign-owned small and medium-sized businesses setting up in our region, to help them become more competitive and position their products in the market. The following also offer financing and investment incentives (in fixed assets and R&D+i for recruitment, internships and training, as well as in energy and the environment:

- **Business Support Funding Line**

Intended to fund investment projects, growth plans and international expansion (ICO / ENISA).

- **Access to the Alternative Equity Market (MAB) Funding Line**

For funding the costs associated with getting companies ready to access the Alternative Equity Market.

- **Innovative Companies Growth Funding Line**

Intended to provide financial support for innovative companies that have high potential for creating value and wealth for Alicante in their processes of growth and internationalisation, and that take part in the Valencian Global Growth Program acceleration programme.

ICO FUNDING LINES

The ICO offers a catalogue of mediation lines available for financing both investment projects and the cash flow needs of self-employed people and companies alike. To distribute these products, the ICO acts in conjunction with credit organisations linked to each of the lines. The ICO supplies the funding and the organisations are responsible for processing, studying and approving operations according to the terms and conditions set out for each funding line. The funding lines and credit offered by the ICO in 2018 can be split into two major blocks: Enterprise and Entrepreneurs and Internationalisation, with the aim of covering the funding needs of self-employed people and companies at any stage in their business development.

ENISA FUNDING LINES

Aimed at entrepreneurs wanting to set up businesses with a clear competitive edge and with the intention of providing financial support for SMEs set up by entrepreneurs in the early stages of their existence.

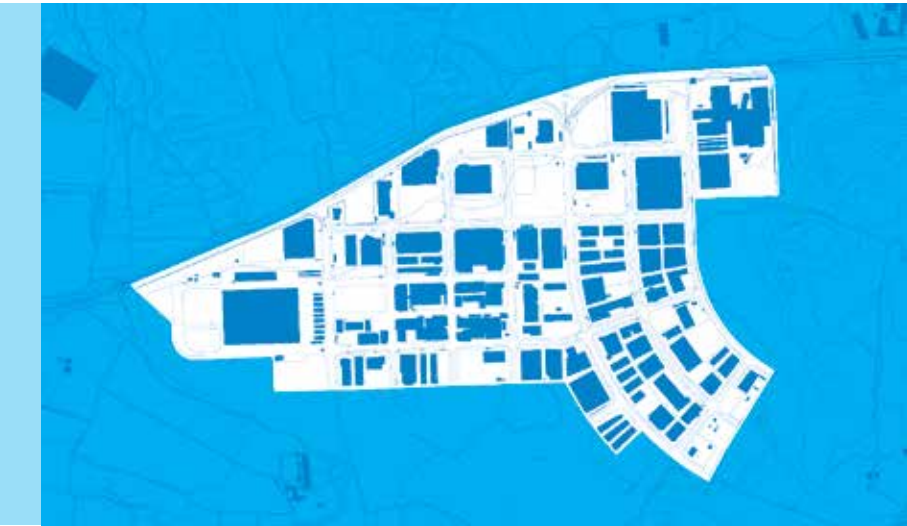

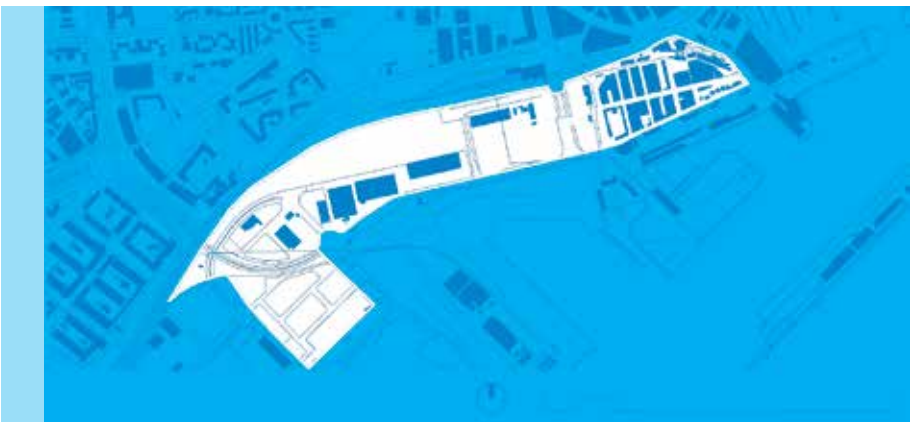

TAX ADVANTAGES FOR NEW COMPANIES ESTABLISHED IN THE MUNICIPALITY OF ALICANTE

IMPUESTO DE ACTIVIDADES ECONÓMICAS (IAE)

[Tax on Business Activities]:

Up to 50% in tax exemptions and rebates for companies beginning their activity and paying minimum quota taxes, for new companies establishing themselves and declared of municipal interest by the plenary, and for companies that increase staff size with indefinite contracts.

IMPUESTO DE BIENES INMUEBLES (IBI)

[Property Tax]:

5% general reduction on the tax quota.

Up to 95% in tax rebates for newly-established companies, those declared of municipal interest and companies that install systems that use thermal or solar power.

Alicante has **6,710,000m2 of industrial space** and the surrounding area is home to industrial spaces and the technology parks belonging to the universities of Alicante and Miguel Hernández, as well as other sites destined for business growth.

Príncipe Felipe Industrial Hatchery

Covering a surface area of 20,000m2, and offering accommodation in 12 industrial units of differing sizes (between 556m2 and 278m2) with a ground floor and inner courtyard. Situated in Avda. Elche, in the Agua Amarga industrial estate, connected with the Airport and the Autovía del Mediterráneo motorway and 7 km from the city centre.

ALICANTE Emprende Enterprise Hatchery (Mercialicante)

With more than 500m2 of facilities designed to hold 4 newly-established businesses. 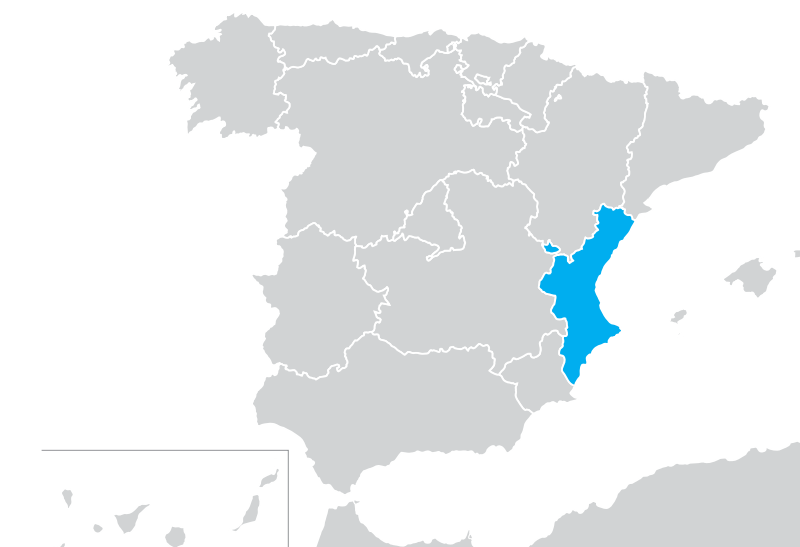

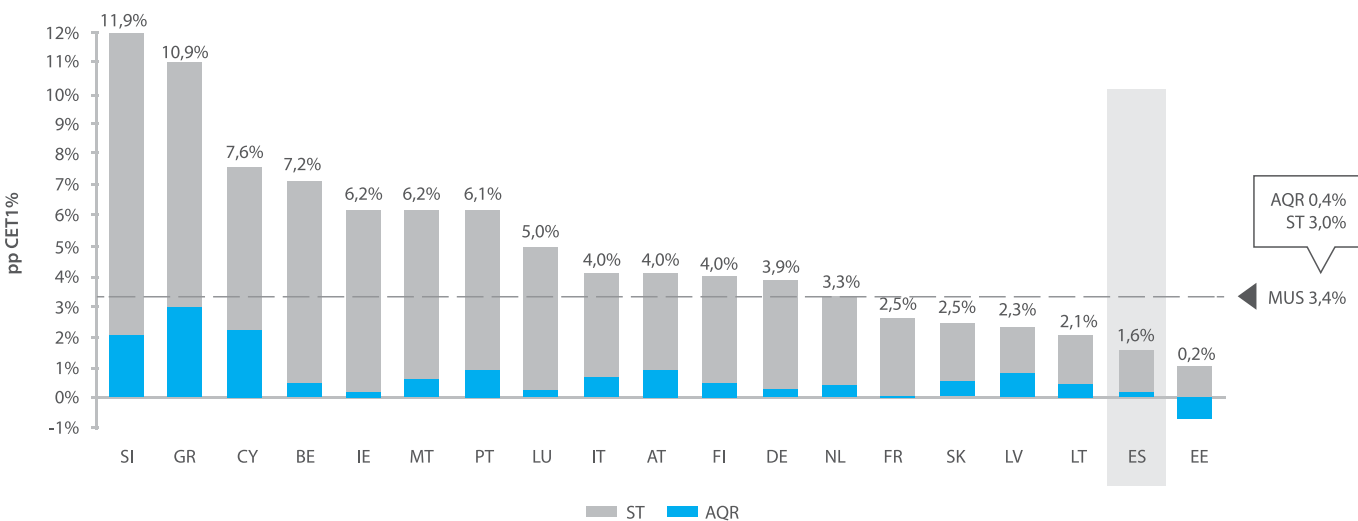

ALICANTE, TRADITION AND CULTURE

The big annual event is the Bonfire Festival, which celebrates its 90th anniversary in 2018. The festival culminates on San Juan day, coinciding with the summer solstice, when hundreds of monuments made from cardboard, paper, wood and other flammable materials, are burnt down at midnight as a symbol of renovation and renewal.

In addition to other religious festivals, like Easter and the Santa Faz Romeria, which pays tribute to one of the most revered relics for Catholics, Veronica's Handkerchief, Alicante also holds a Moors and Christians festival every year. The event commemorates the power struggles between the Moorish and Christian civilisations on Spanish soil during the Middle Ages.
